THE TRANSFORMATION CONTINUES...

In 2022, Norfolk Public Schools approved a plan to close Tidewater Park Elementary School and transfer students to

Ruffner Academy, a former middle school now changed to a combined school for grades 3-8, beginning with the 2023-2024 school year.

This year, the City of Norfolk issued a sheltered Request for Proposal (RFP) for bids to perform



the demolition services. Sheltered proposals are a tool in the City's Economic Inclusion toolbox that limits the bidding to small, women, or minority businesses. Specific outreach efforts to this underserved community of contractors is a priority of the transformation effort.

Seven bids were received and the contract was awarded to Cephas, a Minority/Women-owned business out of Richmond, VA. Demolition of the building is underway!

MEMORIAL MARKER RE-INSTALLED

The historical marker commemorating the activism of civil rights pioneer Evelyn Butts has been reinstalled at the corner of Brambleton Avenue and Church Street. It was removed temporarily to avoid damage during the construction of Aspire at Church Street apartment homes.

Norfolk native Evelyn T. Butts worked tirelessly to secure voting rights for African Americans.

In 1963, she initiated a federal lawsuit to eliminate Virginia's poll tax. Three years later, the Supreme Court ruled the tax a violation of the U.S.

Constitution.

The marker's location is significant as Ms. Butts would stand on that very corner passing out voting rights pamphlets. She also conducted voter registration drives and helped create Concerned Citizens of Norfolk, which resulted in the election of African Americans to public office.

Remember to vote this Election Day (or before) on November 5th .

Historic cannon ball markers were also reinstalled.
