GETTING TO SCHOOL SAFELY



Getting Ruffner Academy students to and from campus safely is now easier thanks to a new bus stop in the Kindred neighborhood. Every school morning at 7:36AM, bus #272 arrives at the corner of Posey Lane and Bute Street to transport students from Origin Circle, The Rotunda, St. Paul's



Apartments neighboring buildings to school, and returns them at the end of the school day.

This new stop is the result of a collaboration between Norfolk Public Schools and the Norfolk Department of Housing and Community Development, based on the community's request to prioritize safety for students while construction still continues in the area.

CONNECTING NEIGHBORHOODS

Congressman Bobby Scott presented a \$1.6M check to the City of Norfolk to support the construction of the Freemason Street Bridge in St. Paul's Kindred neighborhood. The federal funding comes from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. The bridge will create a much-needed east-west connection between two previously disconnected parts of Norfolk.



The Freemason St. Bridge will feature two lanes, pedestrian sidewalks with lighting and landscaping, and will span the soon to be constructed 22-acre Blue/Greenway Park.

This \$7M bridge project will be a game-changer, according to Norfolk Mayor Kenneth Alexander. "If we can continue to take down barriers, structures that prevented people from connecting and from living out their full potential..., and this is another chance to do that, to connect the community, connect the city, with a bridge," said Mayor Alexander.

KINDRED RIBBON CUTTING

The pouring rain did not dampen the spirits of those in attendance at the September 17th ribbon cutting ceremony for Reunion and Origin Circle in Kindred!

Several dozen people gathered under a tent, complete with chandelier, and celebrated the grand opening of the first two apartment home buildings. Norfolk Mayor Kenneth Alexander, Councilwoman Danica Royster and representatives from Norfolk Redevelopment and Housing Authority, Brinshore Developers, and the Franklin Group, were on hand to bring congratulations to all involved with the transformation project.

Two former Tidewater Gardens residents who have returned to Kindred spoke movingly about what the transformed

community
means to them.
Wilma Gray
said, "It's been
awesome. I like
being out here.
It's safer, it's
quiet. The kids
can enjoy
themselves.

There's plenty of stuff for them to do. We have a



fitness center. We have a game room and a playground". Tasheda Kahill agreed. "I feel 100% more secure here. I can actually let my 10-year-old son play in the courtyard. It's not accessible for people who have nothing but negative things to do because they see kids having fun."

Reunion Senior Living and Origin Circle, are now fully leased, including 44 former Tidewater Gardens residents who have chosen to return to Kindred.
